


WLDF CHAMPIONSHIPS

MATHS OLYMPIAD

The third and final round of the South African Mathematics Olympiad (SAMO) was held on Thursday, 25 July, at a few central venues around the country. The top 100 juniors (Gr 8-9) and the top 100 seniors (Gr 10-12) in the country were selected from those who wrote the second round of SAMO.

Emily Hawkes (Gr 9) was selected to participate in the third round at Pretoria Boys High School. The junior paper consisted of 15 Olympiad-level mathematical questions, while the senior paper consisted of 6 even more challenging problems that kept the learners busy for four hours (and leave them wishing for more time!) SAMO provided an ideal opportunity for learners to test their mathematical abilities and to challenge themselves to improve their skills.

We are very proud of our very own genius for bringing home a bronze award.

ART TOUR 2019

Art tour 2019 was an experience that will stay with us for the rest of our lives. The lesson learned in Venice was definitely to "pack light"! There are no cars in Venice, only water taxis and we had to carry, or for some of us 'drag', our suitcases quite a distance to the hotel. Being able to experience the Venice Biennale was such a privilege. The exhibition takes place every two years and each participating country invites artists to represent them at this phenomenal exhibition that took us two days to explore. Eventually we felt a little like Alice in Wonderland popping in and out of holes, entering sublime worlds created by the worlds' top artists - it was a sensory overload. Of course, one cannot visit Venice without a Gondola ride! We were amazed at the skill of the Gondolier who steered through the very narrow canals and under the low bridges. The visit to St Marks Basilica and the Bridge of Sighs gave us much insight into the history of Venice.

We travelled by coach to Florence with a quick stop over in Padua to visit the Scrovegni chapel where we saw some incredible, well preserved frescoes by Giotto from the early 1300s and saw the beautiful altar by Donatello in the Basilica of St Anthony. Our hotel in Florence was a stone's throw from the Cattedrale di Santa Maria del Fiore, some of the rooms even had views of Giotto's bell tower. Florence become a whirlwind of shopping for exquisite luxury leather goods, climbing the endless stairs of the Duomo for a breath-taking view, Michelangelo's statue of David, Botticelli's Birth of Venus and lots of gelatos. At dinner time delicious pasta that was served as an entrée was quickly devoured, which was then, to our surprise, followed by an enormous, very yummy pizza and desert.

The next leg of our journey took us past the Leaning Tower of Pisa, where we climbed some more stairs for a great view. We based in the Art Deco style town of La Spezia from where we embarked on a train journey early the next morning to

Cinque Terre, five tiny Italian towns that cling to the coastline, where we had a glorious swim on a private beach and a surprise picnic of local cuisine. Leaving early in the morning from La Spezia by coach we packed in a quick visit to the Royal Palace in the independent city state of Monaco en-route to Nice. We had arrived in Nice on the day of music, so we were treated to a night out on the town square where lots of local bands were playing and we had lots of fun dancing and singing along in true South African style.

For the last part of our tour we departed from Nice airport to Paris where, despite the heat wave, we shopped along the Avenue des Champs-Élysées, visited the Louvre to see, to name but a few, the infamous Mona Lisa by Leonardo Da Vinci and marble Hellenistic sculpture of Nike (the Greek goddess of victory), that was created in about the 2nd century. The Foundation Louis Vuitton modern art gallery was filled with artworks that involved many sensory and audience experiences which we thoroughly enjoyed. The building itself is an incredible architectural achievement by Frank Gehry. Montmartre was a true Parisian experience where many girls had their portraits drawn by one of the artists on the square. The evening concluded with a surprise visit to see the infamous windmill of the Moulin Rouge. The Eiffel tower was under heavy police surveillance, so unfortunately we were not able to ascend the tower itself, but we spent an enjoyable few hours in the gardens waiting for the tower to transform into a glittering delight of flickering lights at exactly 10.30pm. As far as the food goes in Paris, we were not disappointed by the Parisian cuisine. The tour concluded with a visit to the Pompidou Modern Art Museum where we saw some Mark Rothko's and Jackson Pollock's artworks. Sadly, the time came for us to depart Europe from the Charles de Gaulle airport. The tour gave everyone a different perspective of Europe and European culture, plans for future travel and a lifetime of memories that we will forever cherish.

The day ended with a sensational feeling of joy. All involved walked back to school with proud smiles on their faces.






























OLD GIRL FIGHTS FOR PAEDIATRIC PALLIATIVE CARE

Old Girl, Dr Michelle Meiring, matriculated in 1988 and attended medical school at the University of Pretoria with a focus on paediatrics. Michelle started at Baragwanath Hospital in Soweto in 1999. With the growing amount of sick children coming into the hospital, Michelle's mandate started when other doctors said: "there's nothing more to be done".

Michelle's noticed there had been a huge gap in doctors training on palliative care. "We are not taught how to look after people who are not going to survive: how to prevent pain, how to manage distress, how to counsel the family." Michelle states.

In 2003 she opened a five-bed paediatric ward at the Houghton Hospice and in 2007 a ten-bed ward at a hospice in Soweto. That same year she started hospital consultation

services at Baragwanath, then at Coronation Hospital and at Charlotte Maxeke Hospital.

In 2002 Michelle co-founded the Children's Homes Outreach Medical Program (CHOMP) as well as Big Shoes in 2006 and over the years, she has continued to drive paediatric palliative care NGO's across the country.

After twenty years in her field, Michelle's accomplishments speak for themselves, yet there remains a lot to be done,

such as fighting for the Department of Health to implement a national paediatric palliative care policy.



D6 Connect has replaced the D6 Communicator. It has all the same functionality with additional two-way communication between parents and the school. Some of the features include learner-specific information such as marks, disciplinary record and absenteeism, all available to parents in real-time.

You can rest assured that only persons who are registered as parents of the children in our administration system can access this information. This application also has a screen where you can view a list of all the people who can view your daughter's information. Access can be granted to other people such as an au pair, grandparents and/or other family members by you, as the parent. A person's access

may be discontinued at any time by the parent.







BREAKING THE LAW

Sexting is illegal if you share, make, take or distribute an indecent image or video of a child under the age of 18. It is an offence under the Protection of Children Act (1978), the Criminal Justice Act (1988), and under Section 67 of the Serious Crime Act (2015). Sexting or 'youth produced sexual imagery' between children is still illegal, even if they are in a relationship and any images are shared

CHILDRENTHINK IT'S HARMLESS

Many young people see sexting as 'banter' or a joke, an easy way to show someone they like and trust them, or just a cool thing to do. But they may not realise the consequences of sharing personal information and how it can be potentially harmful to them in the future.



REGRETTING THEIR ACTIONS

Although some children are willingly exchanging images, many may regret sharing the messages, images and videos after they have sent or uploaded them. Once it's out there, there's no going back, and your child may feel ashamed, vulnerable, worried or anxious about imagery resurfacing later, especially if a relationship or friendship has broken down. information and advice topic on the Childline website in 2017, showing the need for people to get help.

BULLYING, COERCION & BLACKMAIL

Your child may feel pressured into sexting, so they don't come across as boring, or think it's a way to show someone they care for them. They may feel under pressure to give in to repeated requests or feel obliged to share sexual messages and imagery. Sexting can also expose young adults to the risk of being exploited by paedophiles or sexual predators, who then use images to extort additional photos, sexual favours, and sometimes money from victims.

SHARING

Once a photo or video is out there, there's no way of knowing how many people have saved it, tagged it or shared it. Children like to show off to their peers and suddenly, an image has gone beyond its intended recipient, to classmates, friends, and even strangers. Once an image or video has been shared online, there's nothing to stop it being archived and repeatedly shared.

Tips for Parents®





TALKTO YOUR CHILD

Encourage open dialogue about appropriate information to share with others both online and offline, discuss the word 'sexting' and ensure that they know what it is and what it involves. Show that you understand that sexting can reflect natural adolescent curiosity about nudity, bodies and exploring their sexuality, but explain why it's important to think twice before sharing something. Show that you are approachable and understanding.

DISCUSS THE LEGALITIES

Children and young people may not realise that what they are doing is illegal. Ensure that your child understands that when they are aged under 18, it is against the law for anyone to take or have a sexual photo of them – even if it's a selfie, and even when the activity is consensual.

EXPLAIN THE REPERCUSSIONS
Let your children know that once they have sent a message, they are no longer in control of it, and the messages, images and videos that they may intend to share with one individual may end up where the whole world can have access to them. Even if they completely trust someone, other people using their phone might accidentally see it. And, later in life, it may affect their online reputation, especially if universities, employers or future partners access the imagery.

HOW TO REMOVE IMAGES

If an image has already been shared, either your child or yourself should speak to the person that the image was shared with and ask them to delete it. You can also use the report button on a website where the image was posted. Speak to your child's school, as they may be able to confiscate phones if they know that they have sexual imagery stored. If you believe the child was forced into sending the message, report this to the police. You or your child can also report the content to CEOP with one of their child protection advisors (Child Exploitation and Online Protection Command).

BLOCKING AND STOPPING SEXTING

Show your child how to use the block button on their devices and favourite apps to stop people sending them unwanted messages. You can also set up parental controls with your internet service provider or on your child's phone to stop them from accessing harmful content.

HAS YOUR CHILD RECEIVED A **SEXUAL IMAGE?**


Firstly, reassure your child that they have done the right thing by speaking to you about the incident. Ask them if they requested the image or if they received it unwillingly. If the image has been sent to your child by an adult and you are concerned about sexual exploitation or grooming, contact CEOP immediately.





